Unfortunately, in the midst of all the good news, came the unfortunate news of the loss of two major historic buildings downtown as a result of fire. The Pioneer Building at Fifth and Francis streets, once known as the Tootle Opera House, was a real loss to the downtown community. Not only was the building a historic icon in the community, but it was located in the heart of downtown, an area seeing a great deal of revitalization. Of course, the fires and related clean-up impacted other adjacent businesses that are still attempting to recover. The result of the fires is that both buildings are a total loss and where they once stood will now become vacant lots with memories of what might have been.

There was debate and some finger pointing following the fires as people looked for answers. This we know: the longer old buildings set empty, the more likely it is that bad things will befall them. Yes,

buildings need to be maintained and secured, but this is a short-term solution, not a multi-year answer. The goal is to get these buildings into a productive reuse that creates jobs and add to the tax base. Hopefully, the necessity of restoring and revitalizing older buildings will be part of the discussion, as we look for ways to clean-up and revitalize our community.

The loss of two buildings within weeks is a real blow to downtown St. Joseph. That said, it is certainly not a knockout punch. Just consider all of the
